Deer Resistant Gardening

Stacey Allen, Manager of Canal Way Center of the Cleveland Metroparks, warned that she did not have a magical, sure-fire way to keep deer and other animals from feasting on our gardens. She did give us a lot of information about the lives of deer and some good ideas for **discouraging** them from

raiding our gardens. A deer will eat five to eight pounds of vegetation per day for each 100 pounds of body weight – a mature deer can weigh up to 300 pounds. A doe will give birth to one to three fawns a year for an average of 10 years of her life. The amount of food available determines the number of fawns a doe will have that year. ODNR's ideal deer count is 10-20 per square mile. In Cuyahoga County, the average population is 35-40 per square mile. Deer live in forested areas for protection, but they like to feed in open field areas. Some methods of keeping deer from your garden are barriers, plants not attractive to deer, concoctions to pour around perimeter of plants, noisemakers, and predators. A normal fence barrier is not too successful. It has been found that a double fence


Bakery Table Hints

barrier is more successful. This consists of two fences with three to four feet of space between them. The deer can jump the first fence, but finds itself in a tight, confined space, which it does not like. There are commercial sprays to deter deer, but you may not want to use on vegetables. Some of those sprays are: Liquid Fence, Deer Scram, Deer Away, and Deer Off. Some repellant plants include: thorns, marigolds, horseradish, garlic, spirea, daffodils, bleeding heart, larkspur, lily of the valley, burning bush, and ivy. Check your local garden center for a list of other plants that may not be favorites of deer. It also seems that they do not like fuzzy leaves or plants that come up in colors other than green. Some known predators are: dogs, man/hunters, owls, and snakes. A mother deer will often leave a young fawn in a protected area, possibly your yard, in the morning and not return until sundown. Stacey warned that you should not go to the fawn. Newborn fawns have no odor for several weeks and your footprints will leave an odor that could lead a predator to the fawn.

The Book Corner

On my top ten list of garden writers is Celia Thaxter and her Island Garden, published first in 1894.

Celia Thaxter was four years old when her father accepted a position as lighthouse keeper and moved his family to the Isles of Shoals, a group of small islands ten miles off the coasts of New Hampshire and Maine.

Rocky and barren, with nutrient lacking soil, Celia struggled to create her island garden. Settling upon labor intensive annuals, she raised almost one hundred different varieties, starting the seeds every year, planting the little shoots, and tending them for hours each and every day. Pests were a constant problem. The slug was at the top of her list. Someone suggested toads, so she sent away for a box of toads. "All summer I came upon them in different parts of the garden, waxing fatter and fatter till they were round as apples" - one problem partially solved.

Celia's beautiful garden attracted the attention of island visitors. They prevailed upon her to "tell us how you do it?" Celia was known in her own era for poetry and prose, but it is her last work, <u>Island Garden</u>, which has survived. Reprinted in 1988 with its original illustrations by impressionist painter, Childe Hassam, only 126 pages, this is a book to delight the modern-day gardener.

Restored in 1978 by a Cornell University professor, using Celia's own plan, the island garden is, once again, open for viewing during summer months.
