Homestyle Double-Breaded Pork Chops

My husband's mother prepared these pork chops whenever we returned to Pennsylvania for Sunday visits. Her special ingredient was the cinnamon, and she served the chops with mashed potatoes, lima beans and lemon gelatin with fruit.

6 loin pork chops (1/2" to 3/4" thick)

1/4 cup milk

4 eggs, beaten

4 cups Italian seasoned bread crumbs 2 teaspoons cinnamon vegetable oil for frying

Rinse pork chops and pat dry. Beat milk into the eggs and pour into a shallow plate. Combine bread crumbs and cinnamon in a deep dish. Dip each chop in the egg mixture, let egg mixture drip off the chop, then roll in the bread crumb mixture to coat. Rerpeat. Brown both sides of chops in hot oil in a large skillet. Place chops in a greased 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Bake, covered with foil, at 325 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes or until fork-tender. Yield: 6 servings. Enjoy!

2015 Year of

Each year the National Garden Bureau selects one annual, one perennial and one edible as plants of the year. Last month we learned about growing Coleus, the Annual for 2015. The Edible for 2015 is the Sweet Pepper. Sweet peppers bring a rainbow of colors and a plethora of shapes to the table. It is easy to value them for looks and flavor alone, but the sweet pepper is also a nutritional powerhouse. A serving of the most popular type in the USA--the sweet bell--contains more vitamin C than the average orange, a generous amount of vitamin E and many antioxidants with only 29 calories. Peppers have high nutrient levels at any stage but are the most beneficial when eaten fully ripe. The few colors of bell peppers in the average supermarket are only the beginning-blocky shaped bell peppers can ripen to many colors; ivory, pink, purple, red, yellow, orange and chocolate. Sweet peppers come in many shapes as well; the elongated banana, the blocky bell, the oblong or "half-long" bells, flat "cheese" shapes, and smooth cherry types. Pepper plants are easy to grow, require very little space and are an attractive addition to any garden, yard, or balcony and that is the reason National Garden Bureau chose 2015 as the Year of the Sweet Pepper. Peppers like a sunny spot. Soil should be loose and amended with compost or a vegetable soil mix from the garden center. Introduce your seedlings to the garden gradually and transplant during mild weather or in the late afternoon if possible. Transplant shock can slow the maturity of the plant and affect fruit quality and quantity. Pepper plants are very attractive grown in containers. The large glossy leaves and petite white flowers dress up any patio container or flowerbed. Pepper plants grown in containers are often small but usually mature earlier. Each plant should have a 2-gallon or larger container, deeper than it is wide. Plant some peppers and reap the benefits.

A Room with a View

Last year at the end of May, Roger and I moved from a townhouse to a one-floor condo. We had sold our townhouse at Bay Landing and purchased a one-floor condo at King James North, on the second floor, southwest corner. At left is a view from our living room looking out over the balcony to the woods on the west side of the drive. With the trees in front of the balcony, we get dappled sun/shade all day long, with afternoon sun on the west end of the balcony. Last year, I planted geraniums, lobelia, coleus, licorice plant, petunias and bacopa in containers. I also filled a rectangular planter box with herbs. Everything did very well except the basil and rosemary in the planter box - maybe not enough sun. At the Herb Guild luncheon in August, I won a Hibiscus tree in a container, which I also put on the balcony. With two chairs and a small table, it was getting quite cozy on the balcony. In the fall, I brought the Hibiscus tree inside and after a period of dropping leaves, it settled down and has done quite well indoors. I am starting to plan my balcony for this summer and plan to add two hanging "troughs" on the ends of the balcony, remove the carpet from the floor and replace with an area rug, and decide what to put in containers. We spent a lot of time last summer sitting on the balcony watching birds, deer and wild turkeys. One evening we watched as two red tail hawks swooped down onto the drive, one had a bird in its mouth. This was a big move for us; we lost the convenience of a private entrance and I lost my garden. But, we love it here. It just seems like a very simple, easy way of living and our neighbors are wonderful, so it was a very good move for us. Now begins the next chapter of our life.
